Letter from Jerusalem

Israeli Outdoor Basketball:

Now, I am learning about Jerusalem through the eyes of my grandchildren. My grandson, Menachem, from Milwaukee who is spending the year in an Israeli Cultural Program which stresses Israeli history, land, customs and the Hebrew language, is a basketball ball player, and has achieved some success here in his favored sport. Menachem was actually asked to try out for a professional team in Tel Aviv, however,

his interview was canceled since he is not a citizen.

I continue with some history of some of the Israeli basketball courts. In Tel Aviv, was a court by the Central Bus Station near the refugee African community. Menachem played there for several months until he learned of a recreational center in northern Tel Aviv, called Sportek and sponsored by the municipality. This locale features ping pong tables, soccer fields, and at least eight basketball courts. Participation is free and open to the public. Menachem frequented a particular court and found the players adept, but playing with softer rules than he was used to in America.

In Jerusalem, there are fewer courts and they are less accessible. However, recently, Menachem found a court, next to Kraft Stadium. This recently built stadium was funded by Robert Kraft, a wealthy Jewish American who wanted to bring American sports to Israel. So, he donated millions of dollars to break ground and build a football field, soccer field, a track court surrounding the soccer field and a basketball court. Israelis and mainly American athletic yeshiva boys prefer the football field. Menachem joined other chareidi Yeshiva boys on the basketball court and after a particularly full session of play lasting about five hours, Menachem was showered with applause and handshakes acknowledging the outstanding sports skills of this lone American.

I am grateful to Menachem for this information about the many sports opportunities available.

Continuing with some new information, this time, via my grandson, Yehudah, I learned about a group of volunteers called "Mishmar HaGvul" (Border Guards). Yehudah described to me his visit to an area near Modiin comprising a group of several cabins. Headed by a

religious career soldier about 45 years old who is responsible for a number of men who volunteer several hours a week to protect Israel's borders. Some of their equipment includes patrol cars, equipped with a very bright torch to flag some suspicious looking vehicles. Other items include bullet proof vests and M16 rifles. An item Yehuda particularly liked was special night vision binoculars which make nearby details completely clear.

The volunteers range in age from early twenties to sixty and were likely to have served in the army. However, they do need special training for this border guard task. Yehuda speculates that there are probably a number of such centers in vital areas throughout Israel. He was impressed with the discipline and effective organization of the teams of volunteers. He was also very moved by the realization that these "Mishmar HaGvul" volunteers perform a vital role in keeping the peace of our nation.

On a personal note, although I often get positive comments about my book from readers, I wanted to share two recent responses. "Your writing is warm, concise and is obviously well researched." and a second responder wrote: "Thank you for the copies of your one of a kind book, bringing Aliyah to life for your readers all over the world! Every page offers new insights and new slices of life delights"

And, in closing I look forward, B:H to spending several weeks "chutz la aretz", meaning outside of Israel. London, Milwaukee and Chicago are my destinations until after Pesach.

A Little Passover Trivia

- According to tradition, Miriam gave water from her well to sustain the Israelites in the desert. Some people honor Miriam by placing a cup for her at the seder table and pouring water from their glasses into her cup.
- According to the Guinness Book of World Records, the world's largest matzah ball was unveiled in Tucson, Arizona, in 2010. Weighing in at 488 pounds, this giant matzah ball was made from more than 1,000 eggs and 125 pounds of matzah meal.
- In the mid 1930s, Maxwell House started giving out Haggadot to clarify that coffee beans are kosher for Passover, and thus prevent a dip in coffee sales. Distributed nearly every year since, there are now more than 50 million copies in print.
