The book for April is <u>Unorthodox: The Scandalous Rejection of My Hasidic Roots\*</u>, by Deborah Feldman. An Amazon review describes the book as follows: "The instant *New York Times* bestselling memoir of a young Jewish woman's escape from a religious sect, in the tradition of Ayaan Hirsi Ali's *Infidel* and Carolyn Jessop's *Escape*, featuring a new epilogue by the author.

"As a member of the strictly religious Satmar sect of Hasidic Judaism, Deborah Feldman grew up under a code of relentlessly enforced customs governing everything from what she could wear and to whom she could speak to what she was allowed to read. It was stolen moments spent with the empowered literary characters of Jane Austen and Louisa May Alcott that helped her to imagine an alternative way of life. Trapped as a teenager in a sexually and emotionally dysfunctional marriage to a man she barely knew, the tension between Deborah's desires and her responsibilities as a good Satmar girl grew more explosive until she gave birth at nineteen and realized that, for the sake of herself and her son, she had to escape."

# Indianapolis Jewish Film Festival

The 3<sup>rd</sup> Season of the Indianapolis Jewish Film Festival features a visit by the wife of Theodore Bikel; and a Jewish Deli Cooking Contest of classic deli-like food.

The Indianapolis Jewish Film Festival presents topics that raise significant issues, touch the heart and demonstrate true heroism. The Festival begins May 12 and concludes May 21. The seven feature-length films will be shown at three locations.

Festival co-producers Stan Springer and Bob Epstein said last year's Festival drew more than 1,000 film lovers of all faiths and traditions. The Indianapolis Jewish Film Festival is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization.

"Our committee, made up of members of several Indianapolis congregations and non-Jews, selected films that are entertaining and thought provoking. All of the films offer new insights into the human condition and especially the Jewish heritage and living in the Mideast," Epstein said. The Indianapolis Jewish Film Festival joins about 60 other Jewish film festivals in the US.

This year's seven films are "Broadway Musicals, a Jewish Legacy", "Theodore Bikel, In the Shoes of Sholom Aleichem", "Fill the Void", "Vita Activa", "Deli Man", "G-d's Slave" and "Nicky's Family".

### Letter from Jerusalem

Several days ago, a hiker in the Eastern Galil made an historic find. Hiking clubs are very common in Israel and people consider them the opportunity to get to know our land. The middle aged woman, a cousin of my friend. Alice Weizman, saw something sparkling in the grass. Realizing that the coin could be of some historical value, she showed it to the leader of the hiking group. He, in turn, felt it should be checked. so with his phone he photographed the coin and sent it to the Israeli Antiquities Authority. Within two hours several numismatic experts arrived from Jerusalem and confirmed that this is a two thousand year old gold coin, dating from the Roman Empire, and is only the second of its kind in the world. The rare gold piece bears the bust of Augustus.

It seems to me that because of "hashgacha pratit", (HaShem's looking down on this very moment,) the hiker, Alice's cousin, has become somewhat of a heroine.

### Adar

I have written in the past about all the frivolitiy and joyfulness that exudes here in our country on Purim...In particular, I wrote that, because Jerusalem celebrates Purim, along with Tiveria and Acre (the walled cities) we, celebrate Purim the day after the rest of the world. One item I might cite is the fact that my doorbell rings, generally once or twice a week with people collecting for needy causes. During the month of Adar, I get a number of requests daily. I need to keep my "pushka,(tzedaka canister) handy, all the time!

### A D'var Torah

The kiddush in honor of my latest great grandchild's birth was a noteworthy event, certainly in my family. My grandson, Saadia, and his wife Devora have been living here, learning and working for the last year and a half. Well over a hundred guests attended the event, including family who had flown in from London and Montreal. Here are some excerpts from Saadia's remarks as he develops an erudite discussion on the meaning of a wise heart:

"Hearts have been on our minds a lot over the last few months., The term crops up in a number of places, for example, when Moshe is instructed to gather, 'chachmei lev' (those of wise hearts), to assist in creating the Mishkan." "A specific comment from the Netziv is from Proverbs: a famous parable, 'The beginning of wisdom is the fear of heaven', thus the builders need to have confidence-and wisdom to achieve their holy task.

"We've identified a number of elements that are crucial to the intellectual development of children--and adults. As many of you know, our beautiful Tehillah Faiga was born with Down's Syndrome. Only in the past several decades have educators and researchers realised that these exact same essential techniques - cultivating a desire for knowledge, inspiring confidence in one's ability to achieve what seems insurmountable, and finding the techniques that allow one to uncover new skills- can allow those born with Down's Syndrome to develop their intellectual capacity and excel in mainstream settings.

"There is one aspect of the Netziv's explanation that I was seeking further clarification in - and I think the explanation lies in our little Tehilla's name. The Netziv has identified 'hacham lev:' as revering to "yiras shamayim" - fear of heaven. As emotions go, fear is rather cerebral. How is this connected to the heart specifically?

"The word, Tehilla, of course, means praise - as in the book of Tehillim, where every psalm is an eloquent expression of praise to HaShem. Looking through the Tanach, though, we find that the word, tehilla is frequently related to fear of Heaven. Rabbi Hirsch explains that that the word Tehilla is related to Yahel (a cognate with the English word, halo) which means to glow or radiate, as with the Jews following all the miracles of Egypt and splitting of the sea. We pray that all who encounter Tehilla Faiga will similarly enhance their "chochmas lev", (wisdom of the heart)--their awe of G-d's handiwork. and that Tehilla will compose her own symphony of glowing, radiant praise to Hashem as her precious life unfolds."
