Letter from Jerusalem

Painful Times:

Almost every day includes news of terrorist attacks on helpless civilians. These attacks vary from stabbings, cars ramming into groups of people at bus or train stops, and drive by shootings. Recently, a driver lost control of his car and was killed as it crashed into an embankment as it was hit by a terrorist's rock.

And, as we know here, each tragedy reverberates almost throughout the Jewish people. For example: Recently, a young Yeshiva student was killed at the entrance to Alon Shyut. He learned in a Yeshiyah in Har Nof and had just delivered sweets and nosherai as a gift to soldiers based in the Alon Shvut area. The boy was from the Boston where he had recently graduated from the famous Maimonides Day School. Very sadly, as his body was put on the plane to the US, one thousand people came to the airport to say goodbye. One of his fellow yeshiva students in Har Nof is the son of very good friend of mine. My friend, in New York called her son and insisted that he return home. I wonder how many other American parents are doing likewise?

By the way, at this entrance, a beloved teacher and an Arab man who had just stepped out of his car were also murdered.

A friend who lives in Alon Shvut told me that a neighboring settlement, P'nai Dekalim, distributed cakes to every resident of Alon Shvut showing solidarity with their plight. In addition a hut was built by volunteers with people saying thank you and welcoming soldiers and others at the entrance with sweets and drinks.

The mayor of Nazareth is bewailing the fact that Israeli Jews and tourists are not coming. This impacts financially on the Arab merchants there. In addition, Arabs are not being hired in many areas where their skills would have been in demand. A case in point is a garden surrounding my building which has been prepared for planting and my neighbors are afraid to hire Arab gardeners.

I have read that our economy is being compromised, not only because of the random and frequent terrorist attacks, but I refer to the yellow labels which are being placed on export items which reach our largest market, Europe. This is the infamous anti-semitic BDS (Boycott, Divestment, Sanctions) which alert potential buyers that these items have been produced in what others refer to as "the territories." In fact, these items are produced mainly by Palestinian Arabs who make a much better salary than they could earn in their home areas.

A Surprising Word:

In B'nai Brak where I spent Shabbat, I was reading the *parasha, Va yeitzei* and I came across an unfamiliar word. Since, around the table were sitting my learned, chareidi Israeli family, numbering 10 native Hebrew speakers, imagine my suprise that only two of them knew the meaning.

I learned that my word *zvadani* which Leah used when she decided to name her sixth son, Zevulun, was only used in that spot in the entire Bible, and was never used in Talmudic literature or modern Hebrew. I had no access to English translations at the time, so from my grandson-in-law, Shauli, I learned that it meant "part", whereas I felt the word "portion" was more accurate.

When I got home, I was pleased to read that Targum Onkeles also translates it as "portion." My grandson-in-law quoted the Rambam who relates the word to "mizvadah" suitcase. The "vet" sound in

Hebrew can be substituted for "vov" and then the root of suitcase, meaning "portion" belonging to a person, might be connected.

My son -in -law, Shlomo, pointed out that Sefardim have the custom of making a festive meal at some time after the birth of a daughter. That event is called "zeved bat"

Meanwhile, we are antici-pating John Kerry's visit here this week, with the hope of his diplomatic skills, bringing cessation of terrorist attacks of innocent civilians.


