Letter from Jerusalem



The Talk of the Town

Where will you celebrate Layl HaSeder? People love to share their plans! A very unscientific estimate, on my part is that probably 95% of Israeli Jews celebrate Seder night. So, "Pesach Kasher v Sameach" is a safe greeting to say to everyone I meet. Meanwhile, the rabbis lecture on "Dust isn't Chametz" cautioning women against exhausting themselves cleaning, so that they are too tired to enjoy the Seder. I heard such a positive comment on the subject of cleaning from my 17 year old granddaughter: "I was waiting and waiting for this time to finally come. I love to put everything in order, including drawers, closets etc."

The upcoming chag is felt in the air, by all our senses. The sound of vacuum cleaners and the pounding of mattresses are heard all over. People even "clop" books, claiming it's good for the book to be aired out once a year. Pesach time is the best excuse to do everything that needs to be done periodically. Since bleach nullifies chametz, we smell it on hands and on the floors. All the stores are loaded with people shopping for Kosher l'Pesach food items, cleaning supplies, even new furniture. Now is the perfect time to buy a new refrigerator, or oven. Toy stores advertise the "perfect afikoman gift" and book stores, the latest Hagadahs. Women complain of aching backs, and everyone is exhausted, working well into the small hours of the night, against the rabbis' advice. Although selling the chametz to a non Jew is a common practice, some people don't want to sell actual items made of flour such as pasta or crackers etc. so every day they eat the same foods in order to finish up what they don't want to sell.

Matza is one of the important basic food staples for Pesach, and there are different customs as to what kind to purchase. Quite a selection exists, even amongst the strictly Kosher. One kind is machine made Shmura Matza, which means the wheat has been guarded against moisture from the time of harvest. There are different levels of jurisdiction of this kind. And there is Hand Shmura Matza whereby the whole baking is done by hand. One of these large matzas can cost about \$8! Needless to say, those who have that custom are stingy when it comes to eating matzas for breakfast on Pesach. There are also whole wheat, and even gluten free matzos.

This month of Nisan is the yeshiva boys' longest vacation, so many of them find part time work helping families to prepare for the Holiday. My grandson, Mordechai will help distribute food from charitable organizations who charge very little and set up distribution points in parking lots, large sidewalks, etc. Many people here buy only fresh products for Pesach so the produce sellers have a lot of business.

The ads for the hotels which began right after Sukkot have ceased, the theory being that people plan their Pesach holiday well in advance .On that note I'll add that my daughter Shira and family will be joining me at Kibbutz Chafetz Chaim where we'll celebrate the Pesach week, B:H. We have enjoyed the experience in the past and look forward to a redemptive and refreshing "chag."

An *Only in Israel* note: This full page appeared ad in the Jerusalem Post:

"Preparing for Pesach is the time for cleaning crevices. Buy Colgate Toothpaste which will do the same for your teeth!"
